

# What is a Socratic Seminar?

- A strategy to encourage students to engage in critical thinking, listening, and communicating
- A forum in which students determine the flow of classroom discussion and teachers serve as facilitators
- An atmosphere of intellectual engagement, cooperation, and conversation
- The goal is not only to answer questions, but to generate more questions

## The Vision

 Socrates believed that enabling students to <u>think for</u> <u>themselves</u> was more important than filling their heads with the "right answers."

 Participants seek deeper understanding of complex ideas through rigorously thoughtful dialogue, rather than by memorizing bits of information.

#### **Debate**

- Is oppositional
- One listens to counter arguments.
- Affirms participant's points of view.
- Defends assumptions as truth

### Dialogue

- Is collaborative
- One listens to find common ground
- Enlarges points of view
- Reveals assumptions for reevaluation
- Creates an open-minded attitude

#### **Debate**

- Defends thinking to show that it is right
- Calls for investing in one's beliefs
- One searches for weaknesses
- Rebuts contrary positions and may belittle others
- Debate assumes a single right answer
- Demands a conclusion

## **Dialogue**

- Expects other's reflections will improve their own thinking
- Temporarily suspending one's beliefs
- Searches for strengths
- Respects others and seeks not to alienate
- Assumes that cooperation can lead to greater understanding
- Remains open-ended

## **Format**

- The Group sits in a circle, allowing all participants to make eye contact
- Silence is not a negative.
- Discussion must flow on its own
- Mutual respect is key to a successful seminar
- One student speaks at a time
- Allow for post-seminar reflection time





# Student Responsibilities

- Being prepared for the seminar
- Directing the flow of the discussion within the seminar
- Determining the meaning of the seminar
- Constructing their own analysis of the seminar
- Utilizing critical thinking, listening, and communicating skills
- Respecting and honoring the opinions and voices of all other participants

## Seminar Rules

- 1. Listen carefully to your peers
- 2. Speak clearly one person at a time
- 3. Participate openly
- 4. Value others opinions, but refer to text when defending your position
- 5. Avoid side conversations
- 6. Give others your respect and accept answers without judgment
